Why are nearly a third of Ukrainian refugees returning home, choosing to live in danger in Ukraine? Alice Hickson argues that to prevent premature repatriation, host countries must be better equipped to offer refugees employment opportunities and essential services to remain grounded.

As the Levant region faces its own refugee-related concerns, Jordan buckles under the pressure of housing the second-largest Syrian refugee population. As the question of refugee repatriation becomes more prevalent and politically charged, midsized NGOs in Jordan, especially in cities such as Amman, can play a larger role in the refugee space to ensure that return succeeds.

The growing threat of "Hindutva" has severely undercut India's commitment to democracy, introducing the question of how this may impact historically strong U.S.-India relations. If the steady rise of Hindu nationalism is not halted, the theocratic India that emerges will destabilize the entire region – and the country itself may become ripe for genocide.




